STEP 2 Purchase cemetery property.

A permanent place of remembrance in a serene, natural setting is a gift for family and friends and serves as a touchstone to those who follow. From simple remembrances to more elaborate family memorials, Dignity Memorial cemeteries offer a wide variety of cremation memorial types. Even if one's ashes are scattered, a beautiful and lasting memorial helps to ensure that memories will live on in the hearts and minds of family and friends.



Mausoleums

A mausoleum is a large building that contains aboveground spaces for caskets, cremation niches or both. You have the option of designing a private mausoleum where you and your loved ones can be together, or you may prefer a community mausoleum which is equally functional and beautiful.



Ground Burial

There are many ground burial options available for those who choose cremation, including private family estates or single and companion plots. Many cemeteries have designated areas for cremated remains or specially designed cremation gardens.



Pedestals and Boulders Cremation pedestals are another beautiful option for couples or individuals and can be customized with unique granite sculptures that reflect one's personality and passions. A cremation boulder is a natural stone with a niche for cremated remains. It often features a bronze memorial plaque.



Columbaria

A columbarium is a memorial structure with bronze, granite or glass-front cremation niches. You can build a private family columbarium for your exclusive use, or you may purchase a single or companion niche in a community columbarium.



Granite or Glass-Front Niches Granite niches can be engraved or etched with details about your loved one, similar to a headstone. In a glass-front niche, the urn and other personal items of remembrance can be displayed in celebration of a special life.



Benches

A cremation bench is made of granite and houses a cremation urn. There may be space within a cremation bench for one or two urns for an individual or couple, and benches may be personalized with custom sculptures or engravings.

Did you know? Couples or families can purchase cemetery property together, even if one person prefers cremation and another prefers casket burial. This is called "mixed-use property" and is a common choice for many people.
